Who among us is living up to our fullest potential? Productivity experts will tell us they are able to diagnose what's wrong with us and then sell us the cure. It's available to us at a low-low price guaranteed to turn our lives around in just 3 simple steps!

In the story Jesus tells, we hear there is another way. The gardener offers an alternative medicine. Nurture the tree slowly; tend it - let it soak in the manure until all the nutrients are absorbed.

Sometimes, lying fallow – being fertilized with laughter and tears at – dare I say – the crappy stuff of life – sometimes that is exactly what can help heal our grief, our hopelessness, our fear – the deepest longings of our souls.

Is this not sometimes productive enough?

What productivity expectations are holding you captive? Take a breath – be still – and reflect ...

Silence is kept for self reflection.

My friends, hear this compassionate word from Isaiah:

"Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters;

and you that have no money, come, buy and eat!

Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price."

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Gospel Reading

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the 13th chapter.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

Asked about current tragic events, Jesus turns a lesson about whether suffering is deserved into a hard call to obedience. He then tells a parable that holds out hope that the timeline for ultimate judgment will be tempered by patience.

¹At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices.²[Jesus] asked them, "Do

you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans?³No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. ⁴Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? ⁵No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

⁶Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. ⁷So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down!
