Please silence your cell phones at this time.


Introduction—Lookin' for Love in All the Wrong Places


Lent is a wonderfully reflective time to reassess where we are searching for meaning and purpose. We'll move through stories of Jesus to find out who offers the "real deal."

Welcome

Call to Worship



Oftentimes we believe that we must "deserve" the love we receive. We work, work, work to get approval and to feel like our life is justified — pulling our own weight, thinking that whatever life we create, and love we get, is only what we ourselves can conjure up. But the scriptures today offer the image of God as our "keeper" — always helping, always present. Nicodemus has followed all the rules and done everything HE can do, and yet he is still looking for love — for tangible connection with God. Jesus says that he must be born "of the Spirit." It's not all up to simply "doing the right thing!" It is about allowing the Spirit to help birth love in our lives.



Confession and Assurance

P Let us join together in opening our hearts to the love of God. Before we even utter a word, we can be assured God will offer us grace and a way forward. For this reason, we can be honest with what pains us most about our own thoughts and actions. Let us pray:

Holy and Merciful One,

we come bringing our deepest longings, and our failed attempts at satisfying them.

We have often looked for love in things that cannot give us love.

We yearn for lives that matter,

we desire relationships that thrive, we want less regret.

We fail to see that you have already given us what really matters: your love and acceptance.

You provide opportunities all around us
 to make a difference in the lives of others.
 You give us a fresh start each day, inviting us to trust you.

In this silence, we confess we have looked for love in all the wrong places. Today may we open ourselves to a change in our paths to seeing with new eyes, to setting aside empty promises.

Silence for self reflection.

My friends, be assured by the Psalmist who says, "The Lord will keep your life... your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore."

Let us respond together:

All We open our hearts, our minds, our souls, our vision to the ways of love created by God, embodied in Jesus, and already moving in us by the Spirit.

We are forgiven, loved, and freed! Amen!


