Children are always welcome in worship services; however please know a nursery space is available for parents who need to tend to their little ones.



Introduction—Lookin' for Love in All the Wrong Places


The Christian scriptures offer many images of where love, grace, forgiveness, righteousness, and healing can REALLY be found. And it is not in the "usual" places. Isn't it as true of us today as it was of the scriptural authors? Don't we often look for wholeness and happiness in places that offer only temporary "good feelings" and satisfaction?

Lent is a wonderfully reflective time to reassess where we are searching for meaning and purpose. We'll move through stories of Jesus to find out who offers the "real deal."

Call to Worship



P Each week during Lent we are focusing on where love is truly found. We know that all too often we find ourselves looking for love in the security of powerful people, sure that they can "fix" things for us. It wasn't any different for the people we meet in the First and Second Testaments. They were looking for kings, saviors, liberators who would offer peace and security in uncertain times. In their stories we see they often looked in all the wrong places. In our gospel today, we will hear that the Pharisees just can't believe that this unconventional troublemaker named Jesus is the One – the Son of God – the Savior. Time and again Jesus uses the unlikely metaphor of a shepherd to teach us how we ought to love and care for each other. No wonder, the Shepherd does what is needed – when it is needed, regardless of the "rules."



Confession and Assurance

P Let us join together in opening our hearts to the love of God. Before we even utter a word, we can be assured God will offer us grace and a way forward. For this reason, we can be honest with what pains us most about our own thoughts and actions. Let us pray:

Holy and Merciful One,

we come bringing our deepest longings, and our failed attempts at satisfying them.

We have often looked for love in things that cannot give us love.

We yearn for lives that matter,

we desire relationships that thrive, we want less regret.

We fail to see that you have already given us what really matters: your love and acceptance.

You provide opportunities all around us
 to make a difference in the lives of others.
 You give us a fresh start each day, inviting us to trust you.

In this silence, we confess we have looked for love in all the wrong places. Today may we open ourselves to a change in our paths to seeing with new eyes, to setting aside empty promises.

Silence for self reflection.

My friends, be assured by the Psalmist who says that "the Lord is our shepherd... whose goodness and mercy follows us all the days of our lives."

Let us respond together:

All We open our hearts, our minds, our souls, our vision to the ways of love created by God, embodied in Jesus, and already moving in us by the Spirit.

We are forgiven, loved, and freed! Amen!

He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.



Gospel Reading

P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the 9th chapter.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

As he walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?"

Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see.

The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?"

He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight."

They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know." They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see."

Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided.

So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened." He said, "He is a prophet."

The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" His parents answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews; for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner."

He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see."

They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?"

He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?"

Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from."

The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing."

They answered him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out.

Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?"

He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him."

Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he."

He said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshiped him.

Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind."

Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not blind, are we?"


Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, 'We see,' your sin remains."


In our continued physical distancing out of love for the health of one another, we will share the peace of our risen Lord by "speaking" that peace through sign language.



forever and ever. Amen.




